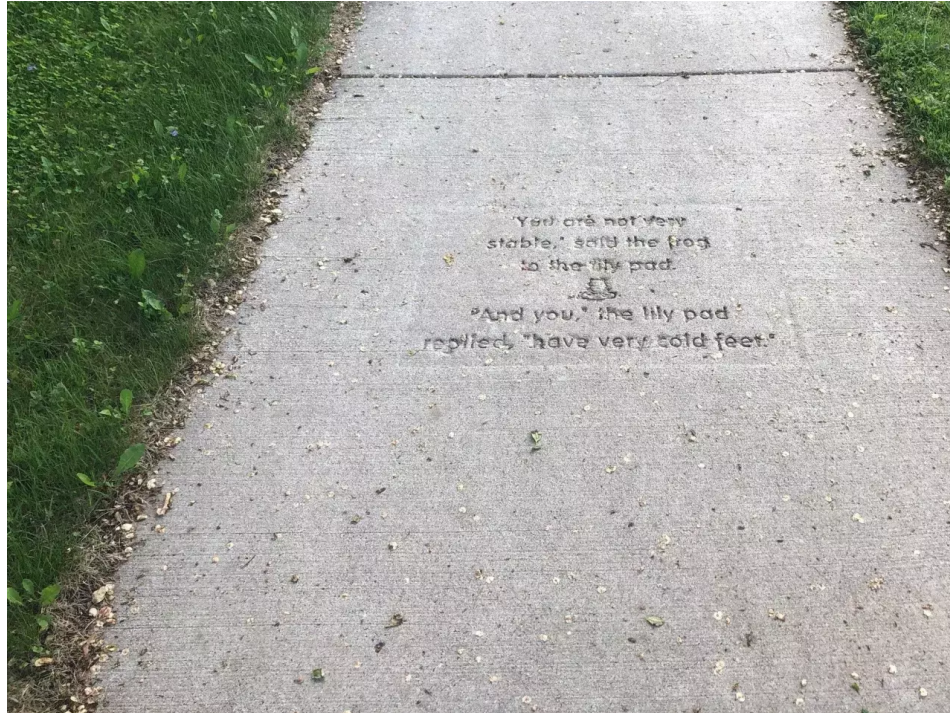

WRIT 300 (Goal 6): Creative Writers, Identity and Race in the Twin
Cities



WRIT 300 is a combination of in-class meetings and significant individual work outside of class by exploring the many ways that creative writing, from books to literary readings to public art projects, informs daily life. Much of the content of WRIT 300 focuses on how social constructs of race and racism influence creative writers in the Twin Cities, from the legacies and impacts of racism on writers' creative process and output to the creative writing communities' collective and institutional responses to racism. This writing class is designed for non-creative writing majors; students from all disciplines with an interest in creative writing are welcome.
