

Advising Overview

I advise all of the creative writing majors/minors in our program. Student majors keep close track of when courses are offered, and we work diligently upon declaration of the major at deciding semester course registration so students can major in an economical timeline. This however means offering SDIS/FDIS options for our majors to accommodate their graduation goal deadlines. Because advising is essential for successful completion of a BA., I make certain to send a welcome letter to each newly declared major, and also information on Haute Dish, the university's literary magazine. In addition, I always send my advisees email reminders as registration dates open up.

One of the reasons I enjoy advising is because it's a one-on-one experience with the student. For almost two decades I worked as a faculty tutor in the Writing Center. I loved my job, and the experience working one on one with students is like no other.

My hours spent advising creative writing students reminds me of my tutoring days. Sometimes we meet face to face; other times on zoom, but I have important relationships with all the students I advise. I want to know students can ask me anything, and if I know the answer, I'll pass it along; if I don't, I'll hunt down the answer.

Part of my work as advisor for our major's upcoming graduates is to work closely together with check-ins, registration guidance, important upcoming events, Haute Dish, GPA updates to list my most common meeting points.

I have an open-door attitude as an advisor, and the days I'm on campus, unless I have scheduled appointments, my door remains open for drop ins. Before Covid, I literally had a steady traffic of students most days I was on campus. Since Covid, that has slowed down. I still meet with students, but on various platforms in addition to face-to-face. Ongoing advising keeps the heartbeat steady.

From one of my majors: "From my own experience as one of her students Suzanne has pushed me to become a better writer. She has given me the opportunities to develop myself. With her help, I was able to achieve the President's Outstanding Student Award for the College of Liberal Arts in the Spring of 2024. She not only pushes her students but believes in them. Through her guidance I became a managing editor for Metro States Literary Magazine, Haute Dish. Although I was skeptical of my own ability to navigate the magazine, Suzanne did not stop believing in me. She did not leave my side and she pushed me to learn to do the work myself. She stayed there with me until I was able to fly on my own".

Letter I send to all new-declared majors:

Dear Creative Writing Major:

I want to introduce myself to you, my name is Suzanne Nielsen, and I teach in the creative writing program at Metro State University.

The Creative Writing program at Metro currently has roughly 40 majors, and many are either involved in one or both activities we have ongoing.

The first is *Haute Dish*, the university's literary journal published twice a year. The second is our *Get Lit* writers group open to alumni and students interested in an ongoing workshop setting that meets on the first Sunday evening of each month. (Sometimes we vary this due to holidays and such.)
